Oh, For the Love of a Healthy Planet!

We will never recycle our way out of our plastic pollution problem.

Those nice, thick plastic bags we can purchase for ten cents at Sprouts, Ralphs, and many other stores were exempted from our state's plastic bag ban ten years ago because—we were told—the thicker bags would be recycled. BUT THEY'RE NOT. CalRecycle doesn't even list data on the recycling rate for those bags because it's too minuscule to matter.

Plastic degrades every time it's recycled, so even the stuff that is recycled goes

so even the stuff that is recycled goes through the process only once or twice. Then it becomes everyone's problem. It doesn't go away. We're all aware, by now, of the life-altering microplastics in our water, soil, food, and bodies.

How about just opting out of plastic consumption? Here are some ideas to try this month:

Effective laundry detergent sheets packaged in cardboard envelopes mean there is no reason to keep purchasing multi-hued, plastic-encased pods or giant plastic containers of laundry goo. EarthBreeze has been rated by Consumer Reports and Wirecutter as the most effective brand of laundry sheets, and Lazy Acres on W. Washington carries them in store

AspenClean makes highly rated plastic-free dishwasher detergent pods which can be shipped from Canada, while additional brands of plastic-free dishwasher pods can be found in our local stores. Shampoo and conditioner bars for sale at Lazy Acres, Whole Foods, Earthwell Refill, and The Mighty Bin come in paper boxes or no packaging at all, and some of these bars are even made here in San Diego.

People still purchasing water in plastic bottles because they don't like the taste of water from their home faucets should definitely invest in a home sink filtration kit. Pur Advanced Faucet Filters can be had at Home Depot for less than the cost of a month's worth of plastic bottled water. Even better, install an under-sink filtration system like the Aquasana AQ-5300+Max Flow, and you'll have tasty filtered water for cooking, houseplant watering, and drinking available at the touch of a dedicated tap. Compare the upfront cost to regular bottled water consumption, and it's easy to see that a home filter is the smartest and cleanest way

Honoring The Huffman Sixpacks

Ray Huffman, 1934-2001, was a prolific apartment developer in the early sixties. Many were upset at the time of curb cuts, parking in front and back, and 'over the top' facades. But we would wel-come him now!

The first apartment ever built by Huffman's construction company still stands. A nine-unit com-plex at 4525 Texas Street, three blocks north of El Cajon Boulevard, it has a kind of scalloped front that might have been considered "futuristic" looking back in the early Sixties. But like so many of Huffman's later buildings, it also has four parking spaces in front (there are five more in the back), making it almost certain that the front of the building will be partially obscured by parked cars.

Ray worked for Hedrick Construction Company in the Pasadena area before opening an office in San Diego in 1957. For five years Huffman learned the ins and outs of apartment development. By 1962 he was part-owner of three small lots and, by supplementing \$2000 in savings and some bor-rowed, he started building apartments. Huffman handled the construction, and his wife Caroline handled the business and accounting end. They were quite a team.

Ray Huffman built over 600 apartment buildings, more than 7000 units, in San Diego. Land costs were low or moderate at the time and subcontractors were willing to work for a low profit margin. He bought small homes and courtyard apartments, erected his "cookie cutter" buildings in their place, taking street parking out for parking in front and back. You will see many of his buildings in University Heights: Cleveland,

UH Pedestrian Safety Workshop





Those of us with stylish ripstop nylon grocery sacks from La Loupe, Pigment, etc., or the cheaper ones from Trader Joe's and elsewhere should wash those bags gently by hand and hang them to dry to cut back on plastic microfiber pollution generated by machine washing and drying these materials. For the rest of our microfiber, "fleece," and other synthetics and fabrics in general on wash day, we can purchase Guppyfriend laundry bags to filter some microplastics before they make their way downstream. Until we all have access to self-filtering washing machines and dryers, we should do fewer wash loads, wash only full loads, and use as little water as possible in the process to reduce some of our microplastic output.

If shampoo bars and laundry sheets aren't your thing (or even if they are), definitely consider purchasing some of what you need at our local "bring your own container" shops. We should keep in

mind that a lot of the giant tubs of liquid home- and self-care items they offer

So...yeah. Not easy. Will that stop us from trying? Happy Earth Day!

HOMELESS CAMP REPORTING FOR UNIVERSITY HEIGHTS

- 1. Submit a service request ON GET-IT-DONE. Request GID to Homeless Outreach (HOT TEAM).
- 2. Email report # and location to Nan McGraw (nmcsan@aol.com) and SDPD David Surwilo (dsurwilo@pd.sandiego.gov)

The report will be sent from HOT TEAM to Neighborhood Policing Division (NPD)

NPD officers will visit the site, evaluate and offer services to people present: Homeless Outreach Team (HOT) and other services.

If a homeless camp is on private property NPD will refer it to Code Enforcement (619-236-5500). Please refer to the report # when contacting Code Enforcement. When the property owner is ready to have a private company work crew do a cleanup they can contact NPD to set up a date and time for NPD to meet, make contact with the subject, tell them to leave so the crew can do a cleanup. (NUMBER FOR NPD?)

If a homeless camp is on public property Environmental Services will schedule a cleanup.

If a homeless camp is on CalTrans property-create a Get It Done report.

Get It Done will forward the request to Caltrans. Please let Councilmember Whitburn's office get a copy of the Get It Done report. Caltrans: 619-688-6670, https://csr.dot.ca.gov/. Councilmember Whitburn's rep: thsu@sandiego. com

A Letter of Agency (LOA): allows SDPD to access your property should you be unavailable. This form can be found on the SDPD website. Also, these forms are available at UHCA meetings. You are not required to post a sign. Below is the statement from SDPD's Letter of Agency that you would sign:

I authorize the SDPD to ask unauthorized persons to leave the property. If they refuse to do so, or return thereafter. I authorize the SDPD to act as my agent for the purposes of enforcing any law violations on the property. My agen or I agree to participate with prosecution of persons for these offenses, which may require providing testimony in court. I understand this letter is valid for a maximum period of TWELVE Months and it is my responsibility to renew the letter at that time if the need exists. The LOA is no longer valid upon transfer of ownership of the property or upon a change in the person in lawful possession.

Honoring The Huffman Sixpacks

Florida, Georgia, Campus, Louisiana, Mississippi, Normal, North, Madison, Maryland, Monroe, and Texas. All have the same footprint but different facades. All with his signature branding, "Built by Ray Huffman Construction"

Ray was able to get loans and building plans approved quickly because all of the buildings were so similar. The subcontractors also knew the layouts. After he got the building process down to a sci-ence, he was able to construct a property in approximately 110 days. He created a "Ford Assembly Line" for apartment construction. All this was done before cell phones, computers, fax machines, or the internet.

His grandson, Austin Huffman, is a great source if you wish to get some history. He has provided us with some handsome 'facelifts' of buildings his grandfather and grandmother created. Here are pictured some. You can reach Austin at 858-761-259 or Austin.huffman@marcushillichap.com.



The first of over 575 apartment buildings built by Huffman's construction company still stands at 4525 Texas Street, three blocks north of El Cajon Boulevard. Like so many of Huffman's later buildings, the 9-unit complex built in 1958, had four parking spaces in front and five in the back. "The city made us add the equivalent of one and a half spaces per apartment unit, disallowed street parking in front of the buildings, and [imposed] many other restrictions, It was devastating to the tenants because very few apartment houses were built in the Seventies compared to what was built in the Fifties and Sixties. Rather than trying to accommodate more cars in the densely populated, apartment-rich areas of the city, the government should have restricted cars in those areas and provided the residents with better mass transit. Such an arrangement would have solved the parking problem, increased ridership on an underutilized bus system, as well as allowed developers to build less costly apartments." – Ray Huffman, 1982
