## Second fire this year under the Vermont Street bridge.

POP. That was the sound heard echoing through our neighborhood just before 9 pm on Sunday, October 22, as another fire broke out under the north end of the Vermont St. Bridge. Despite the bridge being located in a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone, per www. sandiego.gov, and a written commitment from the mayor's office to remove chain link fencing installed by the city under the bridge after a similar encampment caught fire in July '22, the fencing was still very much intact when someone moved in and was living under the bridge. However, this tenant truly made themselves at home. They hacked into the electrical wiring powering the acorn street lights across the bridge and installed an electrical outlet to run their microwave oven and an MP3 player! The encampment also had a plywood floor, storage bins, and a propane stove.






## **PLUME JUDY RIFFLE**

Cheers Bar, located at 1839 Adams Avenue, is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year. A special celebration was held on October 21st, where we had the opportunity to express our gratitude to our old and new friends, whom we fondly refer to as our "Cheers Family."

Cheers was originally established in 1983 at its current location. The Cheers Bar building and business have a unique and rich history dating back to as early as 1913 when it served as a hardware and general store for trolley engineers and passengers. At that time, the Adams Trolley Barn and Harvey Bentley's Ostrich Farm were located across the street from Cheers, which is now known as Trolley Barn Park.

Cheers Bar also has an interesting historic connection with the community. The original owner of Cheers previously owned Diablos, a famous gay dance club located on El Cajon Blvd (near Texas St) in the 1970s. We take pride in still having and displaying the original neon Diablo sign at Cheers.

Today, Cheers is owned by the Richardson family, who have been University Heights residents since the early 70s. The Richardson family consists of three generations of UH residents. James Richardson and his daughter, Sarah Richardson, live nearby and appreciate the richness, diversity, and camaraderie of the community.

Cheers is a casual and friendly neighborhood bar with a pool table, jukebox, patio, and a variety of cocktails. The Richardson's vision has always been and remains... "Open Hearts and Open Minds." We deeply value our Cheers family and friends and are proud to be a symbolic part of the UH community.

# Vermont Street Bridge Celebrates 29 years

leaving UH without a bridge for the next 15 years. Before its closure the city estimated that at over 400 people used the bridge daily. The Sears building was razed in 1988. Various uses for the 14 acre site were proposed including the new San Diego Central Library. Transformed into an infill, mixed-use mall, the Uptown District opened in 1989. Sold for 81.1 million in 2012, the complex was renamed the HUB in 2015 after a 3 million facelift.

UH residents Ianice and Eric DuVall founded the University Heights Community Association (UHCA) in the winter of 1983, initially driven by the desire to halt the development of a proposed high-density apartment complex at the present location of Old Trolley Barn Park. They believed this site would be better suited as a community park. The inaugural UHCA meeting in January 1984 drew nearly 200 interested citizens, sparking a grassroots movement urging the City Council to acquire the land for a neighborhood park. This effort led to the completion of Old Trolley Barn Park in April 1991.



funding arm for future projects, resulting in various achievements. Among them was the revitalization of Park Boulevard, involving new street lighting, trees, and sidewalks, culminating in a lighted street sign identifying the University Heights Business District. Another notable accomplishment was the replacement of the Vermont Street Bridge, fostering connectivity among communities and neighbors. Perhaps most noteworthy is the ongoing circulation of over 4,500 newspapers by 65+ volunteer blockwalkers for ten months each year.

**1917** The first bridge connecting Hillcrest to University Heights was built following the1915 Panama-California Exposition in Balboa Park. The wooden trestle bridge shortened the walk between the residences in the two neighborhoods and access to the streetcar lines running along University Avenue and Park Blvd.

**1952** Sears Roebuck and Company during construction south of the bridge in 1952.Opening in 1953, Sears was one of the first stores to abandon downtown, thriving in uptown until being eclipsed by the malls in Mission Valley a decade later.

**1978-94** Deemed unsafe, the rotting trestle bridge closed in November 1978 and demolished in the spring in 1979

## 1994-2023 UHCA led a 15 year

fight to have the bridge rebuilt, tirelessly lobbying city and state officials for help. Although funding was a problem and a battle ensued over rebuilding it, the present modern steel bridge was opened in December 1994. Local residents concerned about original proposals by CalTrans played a major role in shaping the design. City engineers hired the firm Stone Paper Scissors to develop what became one of the largest public art installations in California. Artists Lynn Susholtz, Aida Mancillas, and Gwen Gomez created 32 laser-cut panels that include pictographs and quotations about everyday life. Each holiday season, UHCA volunteers decorate and light the bridge with over 5,000 lights.

UHCA also implemented a sophisticated crime watch system, Zone Watch, connecting neighbors via email regarding crime statistics and other neighborhood concerns. 





electrical wiring. There was never any acknowledgment from Whitburn's office until after the fire, when, on October 24th, Malik Thornton, a Community Rep, finally responded, "Our office is working with the Mayor's Office and Caltrans to find a solution to this issue. I will get back to you with an update when I have one."

Within days of being notified that the lights were out on the bridge, a repair crew repaired the wiring. Kudos to those who made that happen so quickly! However, as of the writing of this article, the several long-time burned-out bulbs have yet to be replaced.

On October 31st, just over a week after the fire under the bridge erupted, another fire broke out around 9:00 p.m. in the canyon at the end of Hayes, a few blocks from the Vermont St. Bridge. Due to the fortunate and early sighting by several neighbors, the fire, during dry Santa Ana conditions, was contained before any property damage occurred.

The fire is believed to have been started in an encampment overlooking the 163.
